**INFORMATION CONCERNING THE JULY 17, 2018
PRELIMINARY INJUNCTION HEARING**

June 27, 2018
Tampa, Florida

As reported elsewhere on this website, the preliminary injunction hearing has been rescheduled from June 26, 2018, to 1:30 p.m. on July 17, 2018. At that hearing, Judge Dalton will consider whether he should dissolve the TRO, or extend it during the pendency of the lawsuit by entering a preliminary injunction.

Judge Dalton will require attorneys for the parties to submit briefs and other materials in advance of the hearing, so that he can read the parties' positions. At least one of the Defendants has already chosen to agree to the entry of a preliminary injunction, and other defendants are negotiating with the FTC to do the same. If all parties stipulate to a preliminary injunction, the hearing may be cancelled.

If the hearing proceeds, Judge Dalton probably will ask the attorneys to make oral presentations, and he may choose to ask them questions. He could request that the attorneys present evidence, including possibly live witness testimony, but that is unlikely. I do not expect the individual defendants – Matthew Lloyd McPhee, a/k/a Matt Lloyd, Russell Whitney, Jr., and Susan Zanghi – will be present at the hearing.

The hearing will be open to the public. However, if you choose to attend the hearing, you will not have an opportunity to address Judge Dalton. It also is extremely unlikely that you would be permitted to speak with the Defendants; as mentioned above, I do not think they will be present, and in any event I think their attorneys will not permit them to speak to consumers.

If you come, bear in mind that the hearing will be a formal court hearing, and that you will be required to behave respectfully. If you engage in inappropriate behavior that disrupts the proceedings, Judge Dalton can order you removed from the Court.
